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Introduction

Set on 17 acres at 120-128 Robinsons Road, Langwarrin South, Bayside Christian College has been established by the Association for Christian Education of Frankston Inc. to support families desirous of schooling supporting Biblical values.

A Bayside Christian College journey begins for prospective families with the Early Learning Centre (ELC), which offers both 3 year old and 4 year old Kindergarten programs, and concludes in Year 12 with the opportunity to complete either the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) or the Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning (VCAL).

Bayside Christian College provides an education that embraces Christian values and a Biblically-based curriculum. Every child is seen as God's creation, endowed with unique gifts and abilities. Whilst our aim is that all children reach their full potential, we recognise that learning takes place in a variety of ways - academically, socially, emotionally, physically and spiritually.

Our Purpose

Bayside Christian College is an outworking of the Association for Christian Education of Frankston Inc. This Association was established to maintain a school or schools to provide Christian education for children based upon God's work.

The school(s) conducted by the Association is a community which exists to help parents equip their children for effective, God-glorifying lives as Christians in the world by-

- I. leading students into the service of God and of others as a thankful response to the work of God in Christ;
- II. nurturing in students the development of a Biblical understanding of the world and of life;
- III. establishing an educational environment that is characterised by faith, hope, love, joy, peace and service;
- IV. helping students to discover and develop their own God-given abilities and to recognise and respect those of others;
- V. showing students that knowing their strengths and limitations, is part of achieving a realistic, positive self-image;
- VI. promoting a striving for excellence in their lives.

Teaching Staff Attendance

Staff attendance for the 2014 academic year, based on actual teacher attendance as a percentage of total possible attendance, was 97.1%.

Teaching Staff Retention

The staff retention rate from 2013 to 2014 was 92.3%. Mr Holtam left Bayside Christian College in the middle of the year having accepted the role of Principal of Northside Christian College. At the conclusion of 2014 we were saddened by the departures of Mrs Burgess (retired), Mrs Glynn (moved away), and Mrs Bastidas. Mrs Joanne Poole retired after a long history with the College, being employed in 1984 as the Prep/Grade 1 teacher, and working in recent years in the Secondary girls PE program.

Teaching Staffing Numbers

Throughout 2014, 54 teaching staff were employed at the College, with a full time equivalent of 44.0 at the end of the year. The College does not currently have any indigenous personnel.

Teacher Professional Development

Bayside Christian College has an ongoing commitment to the professional development of all staff. Professional Development comprises many areas including occupational health and safety, teaching knowledge, teaching practice, professional networks and teaching associations. The professional development spending is made up of a range of activities where staff attend events and professional learning programs, and internal events and learning programs. Staff are regularly required to update their first aid certificates, have anaphylaxis training, and complete mandatory reporting modules.

In 2014, teaching staff participated in a CEN one-day conference with staff from Chairo Christian School and Maranatha Christian School. Several of the teaching team then completed a Master of Education unit with the National Institute of Christian Education on *Worldviews in Education*.

Our total expenditure for Professional Development in 2014 was \$94,115. This included a payment towards the International Transforming Education Conference to be held in July 2015.

Enrolments

One of Bayside's goals, as a Christian community, is to partner with families in caring for and nurturing their children, based on the Christian Faith and in line with the Core Values. The Enrolment Policy states that "Partnering with parents who themselves support the College's Core Values, vision, mission and educational creed is of utmost importance". The College aims to increase its enrolments across many year levels of the school.

When a student is to be absent, Parents/Carers may notify the College through a variety of avenues. The preferred method is via the Absence Line (03 5971 6798). Other methods include a phone call, email, or in person to the College office or the class teacher. When a student is absent to an unsatisfactory degree, contact with the parent is made to communicate the unsatisfactory attendance and to ascertain the reason for the absences. Unsatisfactory attendance is recorded on the student's file.



NAPLAN

Teachers at Bayside Christian College are involved in the continual monitoring of our students' academic performance, including the National Assessment Program of Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) tests for students at Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. Monitoring is not confined to one test on one day, but rather is supported by a range of mechanisms, including some annual assessments such as those developed by the Australian Council for Educational Research and Allwell tests, conducted at the start of the year.

Senior Secondary Outcomes

Bayside Christian College students have the opportunity to participate in a wide range of subjects as part of either a Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning (VCAL) or Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) program. The VCE subjects offered at Year 12 in 2014 were:

Art, Biology, Business Management, Chemistry, English, Further Mathematics, Health and Human Development, History (Revolutions), Legal Studies, Literature, Mathematical Methods, Media, Outdoor and Environmental Studies, Physical Education, Philosophy, Physics, Production Design and Technology, Psychology, and Visual Communication and Design.



In addition to the VCE or VCAL, 19 students also completed a Vocational Education and Training (VET) Certificate with the Peninsula VET (PVET) cluster as part of their program. These Certificates were:

Certificate II in Acting (Screen), Certificate II in Building and Construction, Certificate II in Equine Industry, Certificate II in Hospitality (Kitchen Operations), Certificate III in Business, Certificate III in Carpentry, Certificate III in Children's Services, Certificate III in Community Activity Programs, Certificate III in Ministry & Theology, Certificate III in Music, Certificate III in Plumbing, and Certificate III in Retail Supervision.

Bayside Christian College allows students to choose a pathway and supports them in this pathway. We understand that as part of the varied giftedness of students some are more suited to success in VCE while others are able to pass but not achieve what some would call a high ATAR (Australian Admissions Tertiary Rank). In 2014 three Year 12 students completed their Senior VCAL certificate and a total of 36 students received an ATAR.

Post-School Destinations (Year 12, 2014)

The 40 students completing Year 12 in 2014 received formal offers for further study, or went into the workforce.

Thirty-two students applied through VTAC for tertiary education, and all of these students received offers.

- 11 students received an offer for their first preference
- 10 students received an offer for their second preference
- 5 students received an offer for their third preference
- 1 student received an offer for their fourth preference
- 2 students received an offer for their sixth preference
- 3 students received an offer for later preferences

The eight students who did not apply for further education either joined the army, applied directly to a private institution or entered the workforce.



Satisfaction Surveys

The Bayside Christian College Community participated in a number of surveys in 2014.

Each family leaving Bayside Christian College is asked to complete a Family Exit Survey. Results from 2014 suggest that Bayside Christian College is valued as a caring, nurturing environment for students. The VCAL program and the team-based sports of the College are both well-regarded. Concerns were expressed about inconsistent standards in behaviour management. It is hoped that these will be rectified by the new Behaviour Management Policy and guidelines implemented at the beginning of the 2015 school year.

Members of the Bayside Christian College community participated in surveys during 2014. Fifty staff participated in a staff survey conducted during Term 4. Staff acknowledged the friendly community and supportive atmosphere of the College. Staff value the facilities of the College, and the processes to improve these facilities to enhance learning. Several staff commented positively on the learning culture within the College and the opportunities they had to see students succeed, such as showcase evenings.

Funding Information

The total operating income of \$7,879,345 was \$569,840 higher than the previous year. The increase is due to increased Government grants and higher income from tuition fees. Of the total income, Government grants make up 64.4% (2013:64.3%), tuition fees 29.6% (2013:29.7%) and other income 6% (2013:6%).

During 2014 the College has been blessed by the upgrading or completion of the following projects:


- First floor extension to G Block, including landscaping and seating at the front of the building.

- Fire access retaining wall behind P Block.
- Painting of C and D Blocks.
